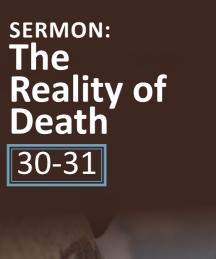

A Presidential order

Reducing the 2026 Hajj Fare

n a decisive move that resonates with empathy and economic prudence, President Bola Tinubu directed the National Hajj Commission of Nigeria (NAHCON) to immediately reduce the 2026 Hajj fare. This intervention is not merely administrative—it is a moral imperative that reaffirms the government's commitment to making religious obligations accessible to all Muslims, regardless of socioeconomic status.

Hajj is not a luxury; it is a sacred pillar of Islam, a once-in-a-lifetime obligation for those who can afford it. Yet, with fares ranging from ₩8.2 million to \8.6 million, affordability has become a distant dream for many Nigerian intending pilgrims. The President's directive is a timely reminder that spiritual access should not be gated by economic disparity.

The Vice President's observation that 95-96% of the fare is foreign exchange-based underscores the vulnerability of Hajj pricing to currency fluctuations. With the naira appreciating due to ongoing economic reforms, it is only just that pilgrims benefit from the improved exchange rate. A revised fare of No million to No.2million is not only feasible—it is

The question now is what are the pathways to fare reduction, in practical and transparent manner?



The roadmap to a more affordable Hajj is clear and actionable. Prof Abdullahi Usman with his management team should continue to identify several cost-saving measures that could slash the fare by at least ₩1.5million from the initially announced N8.2 to N8.5 million.

NAHCON must act swiftly to implement several adjustments, ensure transparency and accountability in every step. Again, further efforts should be geared towards ensuring affordable Hajj for Muslims in the country.

Beyond fare recalibration, stakeholders have raised serious concerns about financial mismanagement. The call for the Economic and Financial Crimes Commission (EFCC) to recover ₩6.4 billion in refunds from the 2025 Hajj and investigate alleged unauthorized deductions is not just about justice it's about restoring public trust.

The success of this reform hinges on collaboration. State Muslim Pilgrims Welfare Boards must expedite remittance processes to enable timely dollar purchases at favorable rates. NAHCON must embrace a culture of transparency, and the EFCC must act decisively to root out corruption.

President Tinubu's directive is a clarion call to prioritize equity, integrity, and compassion in NAHCON. If executed with diligence, it could mark a turning point in Nigeria's pilgrimage administration, one where faith and fairness walk together.

ecently, at the Malam Aminu Kano International Airport, the air carried more than the usual bustle of arrival and departure. It carried a message of discipline, preparation, and hope. Professor Abdullahi Saleh Usman, chairman and CEO of the National Hajj Commission of Nigeria (NAHCON), had just returned from a high-stakes trip to Saudi Arabia with what he calls "results, not promises. The Commission is now charting a new course—one marked by foresight, reform, and a deep commitment to the welfare of Nigerian pilgrims. Upon arrival, he unveiled a series of transformative achievements that promise to reshape the Hajj experience for thousands of intending Pilgrims across the country.

The six bold steps he highlighted aren't abstract policies; they're the threads of a national plan to ensure Nigerian pilgrims experience a safer, smoother, and more affordable Hajj in 2026. According to him, these are:

Intensive staff training ahead of 2026 Hajj operations

Training is the quiet engine behind any big operation, and NAH-CON is pulling no punches. Usman spoke of comprehensive training programs designed to strengthen the Commission's workforce, ensuring that every clerk, coordinator, and field officer can translate





policy into a better pilgrim experience. One officer noted, "When you know your role inside out, you move with confidence; the pilgrims feel that confidence too." The result, Usman said, is a more professional, responsive team ready to handle the complexities of large-group travel, camp logistics, and on-ground welfare in Saudi Arabia.

Inaugurated the Hajj Tour Operators Screening Committee

The newly minted screening committee signals a shift toward accountability and quality control. Only qualified operators will serve Nigerian pilgrims, a move Usman described as "the days of shortcuts and cutting corners are over." For many families, this means safer transport, reliable tour management, and fewer shocks during the journey. In the words of one tour operator hopeful, "If you want to walk with us, you'll have to earn your place."

Secured Madinah Markaziyya accommodations and feeding at fair rates

Accommodation and meals are not mere logistics; they're the daily rhythm of the





pilgrimage. NAHCON has secured Markaziyya-area hotels and feeding arrangements in Madinah at competitive rates, a critical piece of making the 2026 Hajj experience comfortable without breaking the bank. A local hotel manager who spoke on condition of anonymity said the arrangement could relieve the pressure on pilgrims who worry about quality and proximity during the rites. Pilgrims' families often tell stories of crowded stays and inflated prices; these contracts aim to rewrite that narrative

Engaged the Saudi Ministry of Hajj and Umrah in discussion on preparations

Diplomacy behind the scenes matters as much as the public announcements. NAHCON's engagement with the Saudi Ministry underscores a shared commitment to aligning timelines, standards, and protocols. A Saudi official familiar with the talks emphasized that Nigeria's preparations will be measured by strict adherence to timelines and compliance with regulations, with no exceptions this year. For Nigerians watching from home,

this collaboration translates to clearer guidance, better coordination, and more predictable outcomes.

Signed service contracts with Mashariq Dhahabiya (Masha'ir) and Daleel Al-Muaalim (Transport)

Two cornerstone partnerships stand out. Mashariq Dhahabiya will provide Masha'ir services at the holy sites, while Daleel Al-Muaalim will handle transportation. For pilgrims and their families, these contracts offer a closer alignment between promises and performance—clear routes, better movement within sacred spaces, and a tighter link between service levels and costs. A travel planner who follows Hajj operations remarked, "When service providers have a proven track record and binding contracts, the pilgrim's journey becomes less about surprises and more about devotion."

Claims to have saved over 19 billion from Hajj fare to reduce the fare by ₩200,000 per pilgrim

Perhaps the most tangible news for many intending pilgrims is cost reduction. Usman announced a cost reduction of over \$\frac{1}{2}00,000\$ per pilgrim, translating to a total relief of more than \$\frac{1}{2}\$ billion for Nigerian pilgrims with 66,910 slots assigned to the country. This aligns with President Tinubu's Renewed Hope Agenda, signaling that national priorities can translate into meaningful, real-world benefits for ordinary citizens preparing for one of life's biggest spiritual journeys. A new ango, groom who had vowed to



sponsor his wife on Hajj in Kano has just saved N200,000 . He commented, "If the price drops and the process is transparent, it makes the dream feel closer than ever."

As families across

Nigeria's Hajj Roadmap

Planning, Pledges, and the Push for 66,910 Slots

hen Prof. Abdullahi Usman stood before reporters in Kano and delivered a date, it landed with the weight of both a calendar and a compass. December 31, 2025. That is the final deadline for full payment of the 2026 Hajj fares for intending Nigerian pilgrims. A date steeped in logistics, contracts, and lives of families who are counting the days toward their spiritual journey.

But this deadline isn't just a line on a timetable. It's being pitched by NAHCON, the National Hajj Commission of Nigeria, as a pillar of orderly preparation — a way to secure early camp bookings, seal stronger contracts, and ensure smoother service delivery for the next pilgrimage year. It's also a signal of what Ghana's neighbors, Egypt's peers, and the world's pilgrims see as the practical heartbeat of Nigeria's Hajj program: planning that respects faith and finance alike.

In Kano, Usman spoke with a blend of pragmatism and pride. He had just returned from Saudi Arabia on September 22, bearing the fruits of months of negotiations. The message was loud and clear: Nigeria is not improvising its way to 2026; it is building it from the ground up — with numbers, timelines, and transparent costs.

One critical piece of the plan concerns payments. State Pilgrims' Welfare Boards are to remit 50 percent of total fare deposits by October 8, 2025. By December 31, 2025, every pilgrim must have completed payment. These aren't arbitrary deadlines. They are described as "pillars" of a system designed to enable orderly camps, reliable contracts, and steady service delivery. In a sense, the deadlines are the backbone of a process that touches families preparing

highlighted a sizeable achievement:

through vigorous negotiations with state boards and Saudi partners, NAHCON secured a reduction of over N200,000 per pilgrim in service costs. With 66,910 slots allocated to Nigeria, that relief translates into a total cost saving of more than N19 billion for Nigerian pilgrims. For families listening to the news in markets, mosques, and living rooms across



pockets. And to make good on these plans, NAHCON has signed contracts with service providers for Masha'ir services and transportation, while finalizing arrangements for accommodation and feeding in Madinah at competitive rates. The 2026 Hajj is being shaped as a well-orchestrated operation, rather than a leap into the unknown.

Behind the numbers, there are stories. There are families who have already made deposits, young people who dream of stepping onto Saudi soil with a group of friends, and elders who remember the calls to prayer echoing through their town during hajj seasons past. For them, the deadlines are real — not just bureaucratic: a deadline to secure a seat, to lock in a price, to ensure that a child, parent, or guardian can plan for the required arrangements and travel.

The Lagos narrative adds another thread to the national tapestry. Lagos State's Muslim Pilgrims Welfare Board announced the 2026 fare at N8,561,013.67 for the Southern zone, with regional variations for Maiduguri-Yola and other Northern states (N8,118,33.67 and N8,244,813.67, respectively). The board emphasized that the fare announcement clears any lingering apprehension and equips intending pilgrims and stakeholders with the means to plan. A practical detail: payment could be made in three installments via bank drafts to the Lagos board, reflecting a willingness to accommodate different financial rhythms.

And while Lagos charts the price and plan for the South, Kano's board has its own

axiom: October 8, 2025, is the 50 percent remittance deadline for Kano's allocation, followed by a December 31 cut-off for full payment. The harmonization of deadlines across states underscores a national strategy: align the timelines, synchronize the contracts, and ensure a coherent national pilgrimage experience.

Amid these headlines, the broader human



story persists. Pilgrims and their families are navigating not just fare amounts but also the realities of travel, lodging, and the logistics of moving large groups through a pilgrimage's spiritual corridor. The 2026 Hajj fare levels, the timing windows, and the contracting of service providers all translate into the experience of a pilgrim: a smoother journey, safer accommodations, and a more reliable schedule for prayers and rites.

The press briefings also reflected a shift in tone. Usman stated, with an almost veteran's note of finality: "The days of shortcuts and cutting corners are over." The message is explicit: a more disciplined, foresighted approach is in play, aimed at preserving the integrity of the pilgrimage and the dignity of Nigerian pilgrims.

As the year turns toward 2025's end, and 2026 looms on the calendar, what remains clear is that the Hajj plan in Nigeria is being built around human-centered goals: clear deadlines to stabilize planning, cost relief to ease financial strain, and robust partnerships to deliver quality services in Saudi Arabia and back home. For intending pilgrims and their families, the timeline, the money, and the promises all converge into a single, sacred objective: a dignified, well-organized journey to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, guided from Abuja to Madinah with careful, conscientious steps.

In short, this is more than a bureaucratic timetable. It is a community's shared map toward a spiritual milestone, with the 66,910 slots representing a doorway opened through negotiation, discipline, and collective resolve.

If you're an intending pilgrim or a family member planning ahead, here are a few practical takeaways:

Mark the key dates: October 8, 2025 (50% remittance deadline in Kano; other states have similar milestones), and December 31, 2025 (full payment deadline).

Expect different fare bands by region: South



ern states, Maiduguri-Yola zone, and other Northern states have distinct price points. Prepare for three-installment payment options where offered, via official channels (e.g., bank drafts to the state pilgrims board). Track contracts and accommodations in Madinah and the Masha'ir services as they are finalized, to understand where you will stay and how you will move during the pilgrimage. The 2026 Hajj season is being guided by a



deliberate plan one that authorities say will deliver more predictable outcomes for Nigerian pilgrims and a more disciplined, transparent process for everyone involved. In the words of Usman, what you see now are not just promises but results — a message that, for many families, matters as dearly as the spiritual journey itself.

very year, millions of Muslims from around the world embark on the sacred pilgrimage of Hajj, a spiritual journey that is meant to be a great equalizer—where race, nationality, and wealth fade in the face of devotion. Yet, for many Nigerian pilgrims, the cost of this journey has become a heavy burden, raising questions about fairness, transparency, and efficiency in Hajj administration.

Same Services

The National Hajj Commission of Nigeria (NAHCON) recently proposed a tentative fare of ₩8.5 million (approximately \$5,800) for the 2026 Hajj. President Bola Tinubu immediately reacted ordering immediate review of the hajj fare. As at press time, stakeholders were still consulting and calculating what the final Hajj fare would look like. In stark contrast, Bangladeshi pilgrims pay \$3,800 with government-managed package, while Nigeria Pilgrims pay as much as \$5,400. This disparity is especially glaring when one considers that both countries offer strikingly similar services to their pilgrims. Nigeria and Bangladesh - Same Journey,

Despite the price gap, Nigerian and Bangladeshi pilgrims share nearly identical experiences on the ground in Saudi Arabia: Accommodation: Both groups stay in the Misfalah area of Makkah, just 800–850 meters from the Grand Mosque. Duration: Pilgrims from both nations typically spend 38 to 42 days in the Kingdom. Services: Visa processing, transportation, and meals are comparable in quality and scope. So why the price difference?

By streamlining logistics and negotiating better deals, Bangladesh has managed to keep costs low without compromising service quality.

Given the similarities in services, many

Nigerian stakeholders are calling for a reduction in Hajj fares. A seasoned Tour Operator argues that Nigerian pilgrims should not be paying more than \(\frac{1}{2}\)6 million, especially when the actual cost breakdown suggests a more modest

Return flight ticket which is onshore and calculated in naira is usually less than N2million and even if we approximate it in view of other hidden charges, the total cost would be N6,122,364. Even after accounting for administrative costs, airfare, and contingencies, a N6.5 to N7 million fare seems more aligned with the actual service value including \$800 BTA for pilgrims.

The complicity of the State Pilgrims' Boards is hard to ignore, as they are responsible for accommodation and feeding in Makkah for approximately 30 to 35 days out of the entire 42-day pilgrimage in Saudi Arabia. Their opaque service charges—particularly those related to feeding, Ziyarah, and hotel accommodation negotiations—significantly drive up the overall fare. All stakeholders, including the regulatory body NAHCON, are involved in determining everything that



constitutes the total Haj fare.

The Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) adds to the financial burden of pilgrims by imposing a 2% service charge on their funds, amounting to roughly \$90 per person. That's nearly \\135,000—an amount that could easily cover several days of accommodation or meals during the pilgrimage.

In line with President Bola Tinubu's directive to reduce Hajj fares, all stakeholders must collaborate to eliminate unnecessary costs and negotiate better service deals for pilgrims. Each year, the number of registered pilgrims continues to decline, primarily due to the high cost. While Hajj is a spiritual obligation that transcends monetary value, principles of prudence and sound financial manage-

ment must still apply. That is precisely why a dedicated management team is in place.

If this trend persists, Nigeria risks losing part of its Hajj allocation. Saudi Arabia may reduce the number of slots due to consistent underutilization—a development that would be both a national embarrassment and a spiritual setback for thousands of Nigerian Muslims.

Transparency is essential. Pilgrims deserve to understand what they are paying for, and why. The National Hajj Commission of Nigeria (NAHCON) must enforce clear pricing standards and conduct thorough audits of state pilgrims' boards. Likewise, the CBN should reconsider its

service charges, particularly for religious travel.

Above all, the system must remember that Hajj is not a luxury, it is a sacred duty. Making it accessible should be a shared priority.

For many Nigerian families, sending a loved one on Hajj is a once-in-a-lifetime dream, often funded through years of savings or community support. The current fare structure risks turning this spiritual obligation into a luxury few can afford. It also raises concerns about transparency and accountability in

how funds are allocated and spent.

Nigeria has an opportunity to rethink its Hajj management model, drawing inspiration from countries other countries. By prioritizing cost-efficiency, transparency, and pilgrim welfare, NAHCON, State Pilgrims Boards, and Agencies can restore faith in the system and make Hajj more accessible to the average Nigerian Muslim. In a journey meant to humble and unite, no pilgrim should feel priced out of paradise.

n a quiet morning in Abuja, Fatima stood at her kitchen window counting the days. Her son, Yusuf, had spoken about the pilgrimage for months, sharing stories of devotion and community. Now, with the Hajj 2026 call approved, a single figure looms large in their plans: N8,244,813.67. That is the exact fare required for the journey—eight million, two hundred and forty-four thousand, eight hundred and thirteen naira and sixty-seven kobo—a number that represents more than money; it stands for faith, sacrifice, and a family's dream.

The news came from the FCT Muslim Pilgrims Welfare Board Abuja, a lifeline for many families who've saved with care and waited with hopeful hearts. In a public statement, Mallam Kadiri Edah, the Board's director, spoke with a calm urgency that felt personal to anyone standing at their own doorstep, counting the days until December when payment must be completed to secure a seat for 2026.

For Fatima and Yusuf, the December deadline handed down by the Hajj Commission isn't just a line on a calendar; it's the moment to decide whether they will be part of the hujjaj in 2026.

But the path is strictly laid out. All payments must be made via bank draft—no

ments must be made via bank draft—no cash transactions would be entertained. This rule, said Mallam Edah, helps the Board compile an accurate list of intending pilgrims and ensures funds are properly remitted to NAHCON, the National Hajj Commission of Nigeria.

There is a promise tucked into the procedural notes: if anyone finds they've paid more than the actual fare, they can have the excess refunded direct to their bank account. Cash refunds are not allowed, but the Board will return the surplus to the account holder—a small mercy for families who've stretched tight to meet the goal.

Those who've already completed payments were urged to forward their international passports and the completed forms to their Area Officers. For Fatima and many like her, this means their traveling documents can be processed ahead of the deadline, turning a dream into a concrete plan rather than a distant possibility.

Beyond the numbers and deadlines, there is a shared thread among the community—renewed hope. The Board's

director reaffirmed a commitment to serving the FCT contingent in line with the Renewed Hope Agenda of the President Tinubu led-administration, a pledge that the journey will be supported with dignity, efficiency, and respect for every pilgrim's devotion.

For families like Fatima's, the Hajj is more than a rite. It's a testament to perseverance, faith, and her heart desire through months of saving, praying, and preparing. As December approaches, voices in homes across the Nigeria rise in hope, putting not just naira and kobo together, to meet the deadline so that they can stand in prayer on the plains of Arafat, side by side with fellow pilgrims, to answer the call of their Creator.

In Lagos, Ogun, Oyo, Kaduna, Kano, FCT, and many other state pilgrims boards, announcements of the fee have been made with deadlines for payment. For instance, if you're part of the FCT community, here's what to know:

The Board asked intending pilgrims to settle payments by the end of December, offering the option to deposit now and complete the balance by the deadline—an invitation to begin the process without delay.

Fare for Hajj 2026: N8,244,813.67 (eight million, two hundred forty-four thousand, eight hundred thirteen naira and sixty-seven kobo)

Deadline: Complete payment by December 2025 (end of December)

Payment method: Bank draft only (no cash)

Extra refunds: Excess payments refunded directly to the payer's bank account Next steps for those who've paid: Send international passport and completed forms to your Area Officer to expedite travel documents

This is more than a financial checklist; it's a family's narrative of faith, patience, and shared purpose. As December draws nearer, the boards, the families, and the communities all wait with hopeful hearts, ready to embark on a journey that means so much more than mileage—it's a pilgrimage of the soul.

Jaiz Bank strengthens partnership with Hajj Savings Scheme to enhance pilgrimage experience

Abuja - The Executive Director-led team of Jaiz Bank paid a courtesy visit to the Hajj Savings Scheme (HSS) office in Abuja, marking a significant step in fortifying their existing partnership. The HSS aims to mitigate these costs by providing an avenue for prospective pilgrims to save gradually over time for the oncein-a-lifetime spiritual rites.









NAHCON visits Lagos Pilgrims Board, inspects facilities for 2026 Hajj operations

The National Hajj Commission of Nigeria (NAHCON) has begun preparations for the 2026 Hajj exercise by inspecting the Lagos State Muslim Pilgrims Welfare Board's facilities. Led by Lagos Zonal Coordinator Alhaji Mustapha Wasiu Adetoro, the team assessed the board's readiness to support pilgrims.

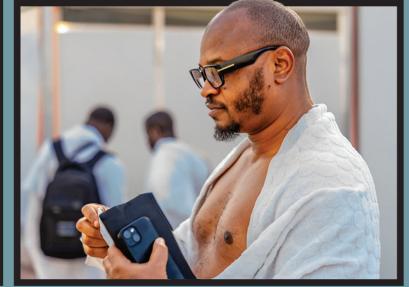














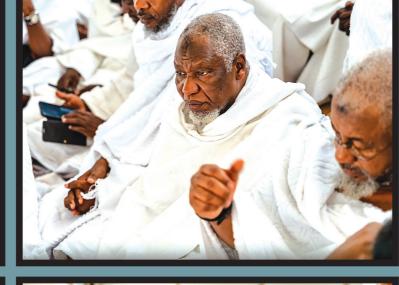

EDDAH: The Ministry of Hajj and Umrah, in partnership with the Pilgrim Experience Program, will hold the fifth Hajj Conference and Exhibition in Jeddah from Nov. 9 to 12, under the theme "From Makkah to the World."

The event will feature more than 80 sessions and 60 workshops, with participants including academics, researchers, and representatives of Hajj affairs offices and diplomatic missions.

Additionally, more than 2,400 trainees from around the world are expected to attend, the Saudi Press Agency reported on Wednesday.

More than 260 exhibitors from 137 countries will showcase the latest technologies and services related to the Hajj and Umrah ecosystem.

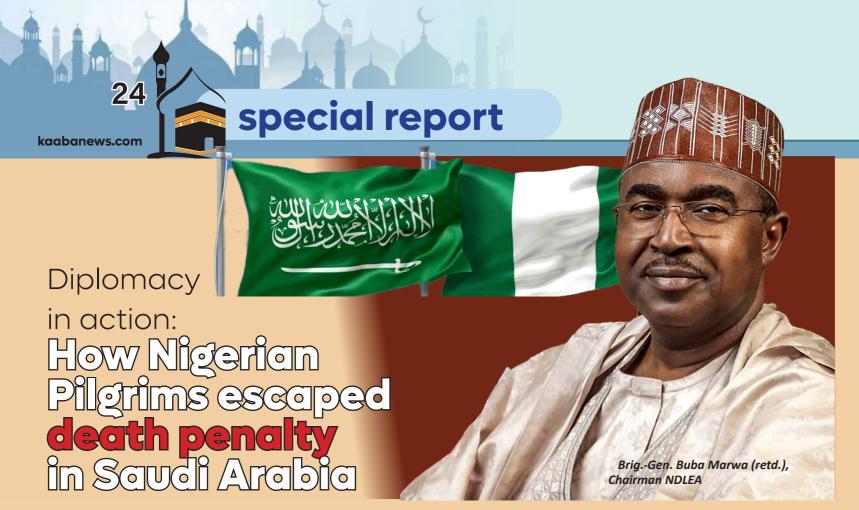

the room, as a young woman in traditional Indian attire graced the stage and treated guests to a sequence of elegant steps.

The centerpiece of the night, the "Book Lunch," featured the memoir authored by the celebrant himself and reviewed by LASU's former Vice Chancellor, Prof Olanrewaju Fagbohun. Guests contributed generously to the launch, their contributions signaling broad recognition of a life woven into Lagos's social, civic, and cultural fabric. The ceremonial moment of cutting the cake punctuated the evening, a traditional rite that felt both celebratory and reflective—a symbolic pause to honor nine decades of service, community, and family.

gos's civic and cultural corridors. hen the flight landed in Jeddah, the three Nigerian pilgrims were simply hopeful travelers chasing a spiritual journey. They never imagined their names would be stitched into a tangled web of a drug trafficking scandal, one that would unfold across continents and test the mettle of diplomacy, law enforcement, and the bond between nations.

Weeks later, in the quiet moments after the announcements, their families could finally breathe again. The Nigerians—Mrs. Maryam Abdullahi, Mrs. Bahijja Abdullahi, and Mr. Abdullahid Saddieq—were freed after four long weeks in custody, a development that rolled out like a much-needed sunrise over anxious households and worried communities.

Their story is not just a correction of a painful misstep; it's a testament to perseverance, international cooperation, and the quiet courage of those who never lose faith in the face of fear.

In Abuja, Brig.-Gen. Buba Marwa (retd.), the Chairman of the National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA), spoke with measured conviction about how diplomacy and determined investigation can clear the air for people who were only seeking a sacred pilgrimage. He was represented at the briefing by Mr. Femi Babafemi, the NDLEA's Director of Media and Advocacy, who conveyed the key messages to the press.

On the ground in Saudi Arabia, the General Directorate of Narcotics Control (GDNC) led the containment and resolution effort. Their cooperation with the NDLEA underlined a shared commitment: that no innocent person should bear the burden of punishment for

crimes they did not commit.

The Nigerian government's team of high-level supporters was broad and active: President Bola Tinubu, the Attorney General and Minister of Justice Prince Lateef Fagbemi (SAN), Minister of Foreign Affairs Ambassador Yusuf Tuggar, Minister of Aviation and Aerospace Development Festus Keyamo (SAN), and the National Security Adviser Mallam Nuhu Ribadu. Their names may be tucked into official records, but their impact was felt in the release of three hopeful travelers.

The NDLEA's investigation uncovered a drug syndicate operating out of Kano's Malam Aminu Kano International Airport (MAKIA). The syndicate had allegedly tagged illicit drug-laden bags with the names of unsuspecting pilgrims traveling on Ethiopian Airlines flight ET940 from Kano to Jeddah on August 6, 2025, for the lesser hajj.

The mastermind behind the scheme was Mohammed Ali Abubakar, 55, also known as Bello Karama. He was arrested along with three accomplices—airline officials named Celestina Yayock, Abdulbasit Sagagi, and Jazuli Kabir. Charges were filed in Nigeria as the investigation unfolded.

Armed with the findings, the NDLEA engaged Saudi authorities in a sustained, multi-layered dialogue that spanned official channels and diplomatic corridors. The aim was not only to clear the names of the Nigerian pilgrims but to bring the truth to light and prevent any unjust punishment.

The families' petitions sparked a probe that set the wheels in motion. The NDLEA's persistence paid off: one of the detainees was released on September 14, and the remaining

two followed on September 15.

NDLEA officials emphasized that the outcome was achieved by presenting evidence that supported the innocence of the pilgrims and by demonstrating that the alleged crime did not involve them.

Brig.-Gen. Marwa underscored the importance of international collaboration in safe-guarding Nigerians abroad. He stated that the MoU between the NDLEA and GDNC reflected a mutual commitment to partnership and due process.

He also highlighted the "no Nigerian should suffer unjustly in a foreign land" principle, a pledge echoed by the President's steadfast support and the coordinated efforts of Nigeria's top legal and security minds.

The release was described as a victory not only for the families but for a system that strives to protect the vulnerable in a globalized world.

Diplomats and investigators described the outcome as a demonstration of what can be achieved when nations align their resources and legal frameworks to protect innocent people and uphold the rule of law. The NDLEA leadership offered a strong reminder: "No Nigerian will be unjustly punished for crimes they did not commit anywhere in the world."

As the three Nigerians walk back into ordinary life, the headlines fade but the human thread remains: a community's relief, a country's resolve, and the enduring hope that kindness and justice, when joined by persistence and partnership, can prevail even through the most tangled of international puzzles.

Saudi health requirements for 2026 Hajj pilgrims

he Kingdom of Saudi Arabia has released the 2026 Hajj health requirements and guidelines for pilgrims. The guidelines, issued for Hajj 1447 AH (2026), outline the mandatory and recommended medical conditions that intending pilgrims must meet before embarking on the pilgrimage.

According to the circular, all countries, including Nigeria, are to ensure that their citizens performing Hajj are physically fit and free from ailments that could affect their health or that of others during the pilgrimage. The Saudi Ministry of Health listed severe heart, lung, or kidney diseases, advanced chronic illnesses, and mental or psychological disorders as conditions that may prevent an individual from performing Hajj.

The circular mandates full compliance with the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's Ministry of Health medical fitness requirements for attending Hajj, including a certificate from medical authorities of the pilgrims' countries confirming that they are free of the following conditions:

-major organ failure (heart, lungs, liver, or kidneys)

-neurological or psychiatric disorders that impair cognition or are accompanied by severe motor disabilities;

-senility accompanied by dementia; -high-risk pregnancy at any stage;

cancer patients receiving chemotherapy, biological, or radiological treatment;

and active infectious diseases with a public health impact such as tuberculosis and hemorrhagic fever)

COVID-19:

All pilgrims and Hajj workers must show proof of full vaccination with vaccines approved by Saudi Arabia. The most recent dose must have been administered between 2021 and 2025, and at least two weeks before travel

Meningococcal Meningitis (ACWY):

Every pilgrim must be vaccinated against meningitis with the ACWY vaccine not more than five years and not less than ten days before arrival in Saudi Arabia.

Polio: Due to ongoing global surveillance, pilgrims from Nigeria are required to receive a dose of the Inactivated Poliovirus Vaccine (IPV) or Oral Polio Vaccine (bOPV/novel OPV2) at least four weeks before travel. Proof must be recorded in the International Certificate of Vaccination (Yellow Card).

Yellow Fever: All travelers above nine months of age must present a valid Yellow Fever vaccination certificate upon entry.

To ensure effectiveness of the guidelines, Saudi authorities will conduct health screenings at all entry points to ensure compliance with the set requirements. Any traveler who fails to meet these health standards may be denied entry, isolated, or subjected to further medical evaluation. The Saudi Ministry of Hajj and Umrah has emphasized

The Kingdom also disclosed that additional measures may be taken if there are global disease outbreaks or international public health emergencies during or prior to the Hajj exercise, in coordination with the World Health Organization (WHO).

Consequently, the National Hajj Commission of Nigeria (NAHCON) urges all intending pilgrims to take note of these requirements and ensure they complete the necessary vaccinations and health checks well ahead of the 2026 Hajj season. Similarly, NAHCON and the State Muslim Pilgrims Welfare Boards and Licensed Tour Operators will work together to enforce compliance as provided to avoid travel disruptions at the point of entry into the Kingdom for Hajj.

See below the translation of the full text of the circular:

Health Requirements and Guidelines for Pilgrims from the Federal Republic of Nigeria to the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia for Hajj 1447 AH (2026)

1. Health Fitness and Diseases Affecting Public Health

Countries must ensure that intending pilgrims are physically fit and free from diseases that hinder the ability to perform Hajj rituals. The following health conditions prevent participation:

Severe heart, lung, or kidney diseases. Advanced chronic illnesses or disabilities that impede movement or self-care. Mental or psychological disorders that could

cause safety risks to oneself or others.
Contagious or epidemic diseases that pose

Contagious or epidemic diseases that pose public health threats.

2. Recommended Vaccinations

 a. COVID-19 (Coronavirus Disease 2019)
 All intending pilgrims and Hajj workers must have valid proof of COVID-19 vaccination in accordance with the health requirements of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

The vaccination must be among those approved by Saudi Arabia.

The most recent dose must be administered within the period 2021–2025, and documentation should show proof of immunity or vaccination at least two weeks before travel.

b. Meningococcal Meningitis (ACWY Vaccine)

All pilgrims and workers arriving for Hajj are required to present a valid vaccination certificate against meningococcal meningitis (serogroups A, C, W, and Y).

The Physician stressed on intention of the action - asserting that organ donation motivated by altruism and saving of lives, aligns with the Islamic values of charity and compassion. While noting thaat the mostly donated organs, include: kidneys and lungs, among others, Dr AbdulMujeeb Tosin stated that the Islamic rulings on the act, provide that the donation must not cause harm to the donour and the process must be with the valid consent - permission from donour or family. Besides, the Medical Director and Chief Executive Officer of "Our Friend Hospital", warned that organ donation should not be for profit making, just as Islam prohibits organ trading or to be done for financial incentives.

He added that Islam rules that there should be medical necessity - a clear need for organ transplantation with no alternatives. The Convener, "Our Friend Health Foundation" listed the benefits of organ donation which include: saving of life; restoring health; giving emotional reward to donour and impacting positively on the society. Ultimately, Dr AbdulMujeeb Tosin encouraged Muslims to be positively disposed to ethical organ donation, as it is considered under the Islamic rulings as an act that save life; an act of charity and a charity gesture which rewards to donour is everlasting - described in Islam as "Sadaqah Jariyah".

The Chairman of the Conference Public Lecture, Barrister Hassan Taiwo Fajimite, in his welcome address noted that as the Science continues to break new grounds, human being is faced with serious questions - "not just about what can be done, but what should be done properly with the fear of Allah". While responding to journalists during an interview, Fajimite who is the Managing Partner, Inukan Chambers cautioned that both the donour and medical practitioners should follow legal procedure while giving consent for donation and harvesting, so as to avoid being caught by hands of the Laws. He recalled the saga of a former Senator in Nigeria, describing it as a tragic story of a father trying to save his daughter, but taking the wrong route, adding that the event reminded the world that when ethics are ignored, com-

Barrister Fajimite commended Lagos State House of Assembly over recent passing the Bill on Human Organ Harvesting and Tissue Transplantation into Law, noting that it was a response to the new realities, affirming that the gesture, alongside the National Health Act

The senior Lawyer said: "We are beginning to see clearer structures that protect both donours and patients", adding that for Muslims, "the law is only part of the picture - our compass must also be the Quran and Sunnah".

The Lagos District Amir of The Companion, Alhaii Abdul Kabir Olaviwola Baruwa in his welcome address said that the theme of the public lecture - "Advances in Medical Sci-

ences: Ethical Considerations" with the topic, is in furtherance of the 3rd pillar of the group's core mandate of Education Advancement. He said: "We are all living in times that are evolving and rapidly advancing with scientific breakthroughs, medical research and innovations, deployment of cutting edge technologies with disruptive capabilities, Bio and Nano technological development that have expanded human knowledge and horizons.

"The cumulative effects of these technological and medical advances have changed not only our perception but our collective realities on how we interact and embrace the use of these technologies.

"As Muslims, it is imperative to evaluate the appropriateness of the deployment of these technologies and interrogate their ethical considerations using Islamic lens and standards". Alhaji Baruwa reiterated that the choice of the conference topic was largely predicated on the need to beam a search light on this development, adding that it is worrisome that there's been reported cases of incidences of organ harvesting and sales especially amongst the youth demography.

He lamented that the development has reached an alarming scale that requires urgent intervention from policy makers, while the various law making bodies should come up with stringent measures to counter this pervasive threat to the health and well being of our young people.

"A country with unregulated and loose standards for organ donation, transplant and procurement is a recipe for a health disaster with devastating consequences for future generations. Organ harvesting, especially when done illegally or without consent, is one of the most disturbing human rights issues of our time" Alhaji Baruwa warned.

He stressed that the multi-dimensional

poverty in Nigeria is a systemic challenge that requires coordinated and sustained efforts across all sectors and levels of government. Baruwa specified: "Tackling it is not just a humanitarian imperative but a key to national stability, economic growth, and the realization of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). It is germane to emphasize that government at all levels should collaborate to ensure that well articulated policies and programmes are implemented to reduce the effect of the high

inflationary pressures on the most vulnerable segment of the society. This will go along way in reducing the number of our population that are currently experiencing multi-dimensional poverty"

The Lagos group's head thanked participants for attending the conference, wishing them a resourceful session.

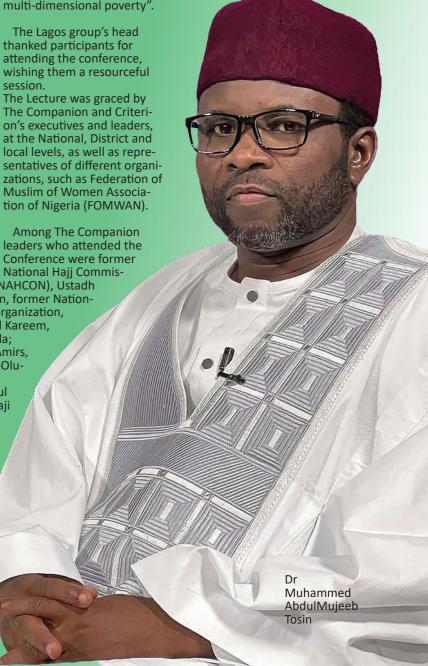
